



## **Society Receives Grants**

The Society has received support from the 2006 Union County Commissioners Tourism Fund for two projects. Billboard advertising for Rural Heritage Days



was supported with \$1000. Another \$1000 was awarded for our Union County Historic Sites Car Tour CD, a work in process.

This year, the total amount of funds requested exceeded the funds available in the Tourism Fund. Total



requests equaled \$128,243 and available funds equaled \$67,135.46. This fund is made possible through the room tax paid by visitors at our county hotels, inns and Bed & Breakfasts. The Susquehanna Valley Visitors Bureau is the administrator of the Tourism Fund.

In awarding the grant, SVVB director Andrew Miller wrote "I applaud your hard work and dedication to projects that encourage visitors to the Susquehanna Valley..." The Society appreciates their support.

# Thursday, August 17 at 7:30 PM (Accompanying Exhibits Open at 7:00 PM) Presentation: Into the Crucible, the Story of Iron Making in Union County by Tom Rich

Over a century ago furnaces roared in Union County as men toiled to refine iron from ores that were dug from the Montour and Shamokin Ridges. Hammers rang in forges and foundries as the cast iron from the furnaces was wrought and formed into basic products for use on farms, factories and homes.

During his presentation at the Union County Historical Society's Rural Heritage Days, Tom Rich will explain the basic process of iron smelting that was used in the huge stone furnaces at Winfield, Glen Iron, and White Deer. He will talk about the methods used to obtain the raw materials: iron ore, charcoal, anthracite coal and limestone. And he will discuss some of the prominent people who developed the iron-making industry of 19th century Union County along with the workers who gave their labor and sweat to bring it about. In addition to historical pictures and illustrations, Tom will have some hands-on materials and artifacts on display to help bring this local history alive.

Tom Rich is a professor of mechanical engineering at Bucknell University. For over a decade he has studied the technological history of Pennsylvania. He has written an electronic book (CD) titled *Building Pennsylvania - Part 1* that covers historical topics on Pennsylvania's canals, lime and cement industry, iron and steel industry, and waterworks. He is currently working on Part 2 that covers the coal, lumber and oil industries of the Commonwealth.

Rich is a member of the Union County Historical Society Board and webmaster of the site www.unioncountyhistoricalsociety.org. Check it out!

## UCHS Tour of Historic Bucknell Campus Sunday, September 17 at 2:00 PM Lewisburg, PA

On Sunday, September 17, 2006, Russell Dennis, a faculty member in the Education Department at Bucknell University and UCHS board member, will conduct a tour of the historic Bucknell campus. The tour will begin at 2:00 PM and will last for approximately 1½ to 2 hours. The tour will start at the steps of the Biology/Rooke Chemistry Building facing Dent Drive. Parking is available in the Marts Hall parking lot in close proximity to this building as well as along Moore Avenue. The tour will require walking up and down paths on a fairly steep hill. Comfortable walking shoes should be worn. The Bucknell Education Department is a co-sponsor of this event. The rain date is the following Sunday, September 24, 2006.

When the charter was signed for the University at Lewisburg in 1846, there were no buildings on the campus. By the mid-nineteenth century, the university consisted of four different parts: the Academy, the College, the Female Institute and the Theological Department, which were housed in different buildings on different parts of the campus. In 1868, the Theological Department was "removed" to Upland, PA and was reorganized as the Crozer Theological Seminary. By 1917, both the Academy and Female Institute ceased to exist, and Bucknell University consisted of a coeducational college and a school of music.

Recently, Bucknell was awarded a campus heritage grant from the Getty Foundation to prepare a preservation plan for the historic Bucknell campus. The tour will focus on both the historic buildings and landscape architecture of the Bucknell campus from the construction of the first building in 1849 to the creation of the campus plan developed by Jens Larson in 1932, which guided the development of the campus into the 1960's. The major focus of the tour will be on the original campus before the purchase of the 170-acre George Baron Miller farm in 1920. The tour is free of charge and open to the public.

# The History of Dolls and Clothes Thursday, October 12, 7:30 PM at the Laurelton Community Center

On October 12, Laura Ruckle will present a program on the history of dolls in general and, more specifically, on the clothes worn during the period prior to the Civil War to the present. Various dolls from the speaker's collection will be displayed during the program.

Laura Ruckle, was a charter member of the Susque-Hannah Doll Club for 38 years. She has lived with her farmer-husband in western Union County for 52 years and was the art teacher in the Mifflinburg Elementary and Middle Schools for thirty years. Laura has a collection of 1400 dolls, most of which are housed in the "Doll House" that was built by her husband. She welcomes single and "van" visitors to see her dolls, however it is necessary to telephone for an appointment.

This program will be presented in the Laurelton Community Center, located in the village of Laurelton. From Route 45 take Route 235 towards Laurelton. The center is along Route 235 approximately one tenth of a mile south of the intersection with Weikert Road. The program is open to the public and is free of charge.

# Annual John B. Deans Dinner and Program Thursday, November 9, 6:00 PM at the Carriage Corner Restaurant, Mifflinburg

The Farringtons and the Political Culture of Moonshine in Central Pennsylvania will be presented by Bruce Teeple following the annual dinner. This talk focuses on how the people of the region, as well as their social and political institutions, responded to the Federal government's prohibition of alcohol.

Bruce Teeple is a local historian, free-lance writer, and community columnist for the *Centre Daily Times*. A graduate of Penn State in history and political science, Teeple worked in the University's Office of Physical Plant for over thirty years as an equipment operator. He also served as curator of the Aaronsburg Historical Museum for twenty years and co-edited *Glimpses of the Past* and *In Schadde vun Rundkopp (In the Shadow of Roundtop)*. In 2002, the Centre County Historical Society recognized Teeple's presentations on central Pennsylvania history in area schools and before various organizations. He has served on several committees for the American Association for State and Local History and recently was on the grant review committee for the History Channel's *Save Our History* program. Teeple is currently writing a book: *As Good As A Handshake: The Farringtons and the Political Culture of Moonshine in Central Pennsylvania*.

Dinner will be buffet with choice of entrees and sides, salad, dessert and beverages. Annual awards in recognition of contributions to the Society will be presented. The program will follow.

#### ARCHIVES AND MUSEUM REPORT

The Archives and Museum Committee started the year moving over 50 boxes of small objects to the Dale-Engle-Walker collections area, thereby completing a slow two-year transition to the new facility. On March 26th, the committee held an open house for members only.

The open house showed how objects are physically numbered, cataloged on sheets with that information being entered into a computer. The open house also showcased archival storage materials and our facility which includes customized walls for hanging framed items and all new shelving, the latter being funded primarily by member Jean Ruhl.

The newly constructed wagon shed at the Dale-Engle-Walker property will have a substantial part of the collection of farm vehicles and tools on permanent view. This exhibition has been made possible through the generous giving of farming objects to the Society by Paul & Phyllis Heim. Gary Slear had been working with the Heims on this gifting effort. The wagon shed will open for public viewing starting at August's Rural Heritage Days.

The past six months the committee members have also been busy with the gifting and purchasing of hundreds of items.

- A quilt designed by Mary Koons and made by Mrs. Stoltzfus, that features Mifflinburg post cards in the "attic windows" pieced pattern
- Green Dragons (Lewisburg High School) souvenir deck of playing cards

To keep the collection in order, museum consultants worked two days on the collection in March and April and will return in August to catalog the collection in the wagon shed. They are paid through a Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission grant. Also supported by these funds was former intern and Penn State graduate Becky Keister who worked for ten days in April with Jeannette Lasansky organizing collection boxes and creating spread sheets on the thousands of paper and advertising items in the collection that need to be easily accessed (school, church, and agricultural material, ledgers, deeds, invoices and letterheads, Lewisburg/ Mifflinburg/ countywide advertising items, New Berlin imprints, Pennsylvania House catalogs, area publications and area authors' books, military and POSA material, bank material, and the Linn/Focht/Foster collections). The spread sheets help provide access to what specific items the Society owns without having to physically see the items.


#### THANK YOU TO OUR VOLUNTEERS AT THE DALE-ENGLE-WALKER HOUSE


Many thanks to those who lent a hand or sent in financial support for our Dale-Engle-Walker property or both!
