A Message from the President

Dear Sojourners into History,

I have been reviewing pictures of earlier times in Lewisburg for the pictorial history of Lewisburg book that the Historical Society is publishing in collaboration with Packwood House. Again and again I find myself declaring, "How things have changed!"

Of course, we are all aware of the "big" changes in history—landing on the moon, a computer on every desk, Vietnam as today's tourist destination. But in Union County things have changed fast, too.

Remember the Lyon's Gift Shop, Prowant's, and Bechtel's? Lewisburg

once had an Opera House, a Pennsylvania House Factory which started out as a nail factory, and a privately owned Academy on the corner of Front and St. Mary Streets.

It is more than nostalgia to remember the structures and activities of past times. These times all contributed in indirect ways to our inner landscape as well as to the outer physical landscape. We have memories associated with them. I will tell you one of mine.

I arrived in Lewisburg in 1971. My parents, who lived in the Philadelphia area, helped me move in. They used to visit on occasion, and we would go for walks through Lewisburg to get to know it better. On one of those walks, we passed the Old Academy building and remarked on it. "What is it?" we asked one another. As we walked by, a woman was sitting on her porch across the street from the Academy building. I turned to her and asked her if she knew what it was. "Oh, yes," she said, smiling broadly, delighted to be of help in telling us. I no longer remember her exact words. I do remember being happy, in the company of my parents, and especially walking with my father who died shortly thereafter. I remember the pleased look of the woman who was so happy to share her memory. I think of these things every time I see a picture of the Old Academy. It was torn down in 1975.

Local history ties us to the past. It reminds us of who we are and of those who came before. It helps us honor their accomplishments as we build on them. It allows us to rest, for one small quiet moment, in a memory of someone or something, a gift from the past to the present. Sharing memories brings us all closer together.

Join us as we make visible the history of Union County, as we bring alive the memories of the past and try to understand them. We need each other to do that well. Let us celebrate together the way things were and remember together who we are as a community. I hope to see you at our upcoming events.

Thursday, August 12 at 7 PM, local author Nada Gray will give a talk on the wide variety of "Make Do" items on 19th- and early 20th-century farms. Examples include the ingenious repair of broken pottery pitchers by tinkers with inventive tinware handles, wooden plates with a wire staple to hold a crack tight; and eggs dyed with onion skins and then scratch decorated.

The talk complements the "Making Do" exhibit on display at the house.

On Friday, August 13 at 5 in the evening, the porch of the house will be brimming with goods to be auctioned off to the highest bidder as they did in the 19th century when an auction was called a "vendue" and when the food served might be an oyster stew rather than a boiled frank or beef barbeque.

Come bid on many local items and collectibles. The event has been organized by Mary Jo Spangler and Sue Mapes, both of whom like the sound of an auctioneer's patter. Items will range from a mighty Millville wagon, highly desirable long rifle or a rare local advertising item, to useful farm tools and house goods. The food wagon will feature chicken corn soup and other good food by the folks of Hartley Township.

Saturday, August 14, 10 AM to 4 PM will be a full day of good food, demonstrations and activities: chicken barbecue by Eli Reiff family and friends, homemade ice cream by Steven Beiler of Elimsport, hit-and-miss or steam-driven machines that will do threshing and binding, shingle making, hay baling, or turning bats on a lathe. New this year will be Robert E. Lee, potter, Mihai Epure, a mason working on the barn wall, a rug hooker, a charcoal maker, a dulcimer player, and more.

Relax in a porch rocker, learn, participate, listen to music, and eat, all at an 18th-century farm beside Buffalo Creek. \$3/car donation for parking.

This is a wonderful series of events, held nearby, according to Mary Jo Spangler and Deb Wehr, co-chairs of Saturday's event.

Starting in December 2010, commemorative items from bicentennials and sesquicentennials, as well as anniversaries of local businesses, will be on display at the Government Center and at the UCHS county courthouse office. It is time to begin planning our county's bicentennial in 2013. Upcoming exhibits will show how we celebrated in the past.

GRANTS

The Society received \$1933 from The Edna M. Sheary for Charity Trust for a Civil War program for ninth grade students in Union County. The program will increase awareness of the impact of the Civil War on people in the county, by offering first person interpretation using local diaries by a Civil War veteran, a soldier/surgeon, and local young women. UCHS Education Coordinator / historical re-enactor Linda Estupinan Snook will develop the program with the local schools.

The Society received a *PA Historical* and *Museum Commission* grant of \$10,000 for general operating support. This grant covers Linda Estupinan Snook's in-class lessons to our two school districts, and the Red Bank School project. PHMC monies also cover cataloging costs as items are acquired for the Society collection, and office support for education and archives.



COLLECTIONS



Archives & Museum Committee by Jeff Spotts

Since January 2010 the Archives and Museum Committee has been exceedingly busy (as usual). We experienced the departure of valued committee member Forrest Fothergill, who moved to Sycamore, Illinois, and have added new members: Mary Jo Spangler of New Berlin, Deb Wehr of Mifflinburg, and Tom Greaves of Lewisburg.

Many gifts were received, the largest being a donation from Bucknell University of non-Bucknell material, some of which had been housed by the University since the 1950s, including records of the Union County Bicentennial Commission, Tuesday Book Club, and the Business and Professional Women's Club of Lewisburg; 13 boxes of early deeds and maps, business ledgers and photographs of Andrew Leiser, as well as printed books, cards, programs, and performance tickets. More material is coming our way this summer. We will list especially important additions from this group that might particularly aid in research efforts.

We have also been busy cleaning up a few longstanding items. The Committee, like individuals, sometimes put decisions "on the back burner." As we get closer to being "caught up" we can get to those back burner items and are doing so. Jeannette Lasansky, who heads collection's care, worked with our consultants/archivists Susan Shiffrin and Michael D'Angelo in early March and looks forward to the next all-day session with them in late 2010. Deb Wehr has begun to help with the archives and museum's data sheets and collection entry.

The Committee looks forward to the acquisition of much-needed new collections software and two laptops, purchased through an estate gift of the late Mary Maher. The Society had sought state support for this but funding is no longer available due to state budget cuts. Having the software will allow volunteers to do some, though not all, of the cataloging work we have had consultants doing with us for over two decades.

Civil War Research

April 2011 marks the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the Civil War.

The Union County Historical Society and other area historical groups are actively researching the war as related to local history. We are also investigating the Underground Railroad and the role of free black residents and Methodist, Quaker and Mennonite congregations in supporting this "road to freedom."

The Civil War will be a focus of study and programs for the Society and others for the next several years. Volunteers are needed to help with research and programming. We encourage high school and university students to get involved - primary source material is available for senior projects and theses.

Society's Dale/Engle/Walker Property by Jeannette Lasansky

Spring and summer volunteer work sessions, conducted since 2001 when the Society acquired this historic property, are essential to making the Dale/Engle/Walker site look attractive and welcoming.

On April 10th this year 40 scouts, Bucknell students, and members of the Union County Historical Society and the Merrill W. Linn Land and Waterways Conservancy worked together for three hours on a particularly beautiful Saturday. Together they did a cleanup of Strawbridge Road, gathered winter tree debris, weeded and mulched, and planted an "Engle restoration" quince tree at the house, and cedar trees at the trail parking lot. The work teams also filled the farm lane's pot holes, cleaned the milk house, removed tree stumps and rocks from an acre now cleared of invasive plants, and improved the trail's switchback area.

Society members Bill and Billy Deitrick, Jeannette Lasansky, Steve Wilver, Mark & Deb Wehr, Tom Rich, David Goehring, and Diane Meixell were joined by Conservancy members Dave Hursh, Carl Oberheim, Allen Schweinsberg, Tom Travis, and Ben Hoskins.

Prior to the workday, Roxy Carl (pictured at right) had worked solo on the tiered

flower gardens that she has been in charge of for three years, and member Gary Spangler cleaned the Wagon Shed and its displays.

Conservancy Coordinator Geoff Goodenow, BU student coordinator Poppy Goforth, and property managers Jeannette Lasansky and Bill Deitrick marshaled the forces, and planned the tasks and their completion.



The Dale/Engle/Walker Property is Open for Tours Sundays 2 to 4 PM through October

The Dale/Engle/Walker historic site features the Georgian-style limestone house, built c. 1793 by early settler Samuel Dale, with Federal ell added between 1820 and 1840. Guided tours include the original 1793 hearth

with period cookware and the replicated 1804 Dale Library collection. Your tour guide will discuss architecture, early immigration,

slavery and the Underground Railroad, and other interesting aspects of Union County history.

The Wagon Shed exhibit features period farm equipment and tools from the Society's collection. The newly restored Milk House has

panels explaining the dairy operation at the farm in the early 1900's. Interactive audio stations enhance the tour experience.

Admission is only \$4/adult, \$2/student grades 7-12, \$1/student grades 1-6, free for preschoolers. Members \$1 off.



In collaboration with Packwood House, the Union County Historical Society is publishing **Lewisburg** as part of the Images of America series established by Arcadia Publishing. This 128-page volume, authored by Lois Huffines and Richard Sauers, will show through period photographs the history of Lewisburg from its earliest beginnings until recent times.

Lewisburg has always been a center of trade and culture as a river and canal town on the banks of the Susquehanna River. Once served by two railroads and a tiny airport, Lewisburg's bridges and roads connected it to distant cities and rich hinterlands. Even today just seven miles south of Interstate 80, it has the resources of a city but the charm of a small town still surrounded by farms and fields. Elegant 18th and 19th century homes grace its streets, and churches cluster on many of its corners. Named as the Union County seat in 1855, the story of the town and adjacent Kelly and East Buffalo Townships reveals the great story of small-town America. Lewisburg and its surrounding townships prospered on the backs of hard-working people, people with ideas, vision, and a willingness to take risks.

Lewisburg will enable readers to connect to their past, remember their own earlier days, and gain a better understanding of how its earlier history influenced the town we know today. You may even see photos of your own



The Lewisburg volume is one of four envisioned about Union County in anticipation of the County's Bicentennial celebration in 2013. A second volume on Union County River Towns (other than Lewisburg) will be published in 2011. A third volume on Mifflinburg and surrounding towns is slated for 2012, and a fourth volume on New Berlin and its area will complete the series in 2013.

A Profile of UCHS New Board Members

Tom Greaves of Lewisburg is a graduate of Cornell University Department of Anthropology. He is Professor Emeritus of Anthropology at Bucknell University.

Greaves has researched and written on cultural anthropology issues in the Andean world, and on the contemporary struggles of indigenous groups of the US and Canada and is involved in a number of professional anthropology associations.

Tom Greaves is editor and contributor to Intellectual Property Rights for Indigenous Peoples, a Sourcebook, the North American volume of Endangered Peoples, and Vicos and Beyond, a Half-Century of Applied Anthropology in Peru (expected 2010). He was cultural anthropology editor for the American Anthropologist.

A new interest is the anthropology of architecture - the connection of people and their dwellings. Tom and his team of Bucknell students produced a photographic inventory of Lewisburg's Historic District, now on CD. Tom also supervised production of the slide collections of Lewisburg buildings by Catherine DeEtte Edgett (1950s-60s) and Florence Pyle (early 2000s) for the Public Library of Union County.

Tom Greaves will fill the two years of Forrest Fothergill's term that ends in 2012.

Steve Wilver is a current board member from White Deer Township who filled the unexpired term of Josh Muchler in March 2010.

Wilver is a civil engineer for Larson Design in Williamsport. He has a farm background and is the son of Donald Wilver - well known in the area for his historical research.

Steve has worked with his father extensively in restoring several antique vehicles and farm equipment. He is a lifelong resident of White Deer Township and will ably represent that portion of the county.

Steve Wilver is nominated for a three-term ending in 2013.

David Goehring, who lives in Lewisburg, has long-time family ties to Mifflinburg and the West End of Union County. A current board member, past VP and President, he was born in Pittsburgh.

David received a BS in Mechanical Engineering from Lafayette College and after serving two years as a U.S. Army officer in the Ordinance Corps, he spent his working career in railroads for 41 years: first in the Mechanical Department of the Pennsylvania RR then as Chief Mechanical Officer of the Lehigh Valley Railroad in Sayre, and then at Amtrak in Washington D.C. to help establish the Locomotive Department. He retired in 1994 as Superintendent of Locomotive Maintenance.

David is involved in other community groups, such as the Mifflinburg Buggy Museum, and sings in the Susquehanna Valley Chorale.

Duaine Shaw of Weikert will bring to the Society extensive knowledge of Union County's West End since he is native of Hartley Township and a graduate of Mifflinburg High School. He is nominated for his first 3-year term.

Shaw graduated from The Pennsylvania State University with a BS in Zoology and Entomology and from the University of Michigan with a Masters in Public Health.

He is retired from the PA Department of Environmental Resources (Environmental Health Specialist). He is a former board member of the West End Library and a current board member of Lower Penns Creek Watershed Association.

This slate was presented to the board in March 2010 by the nominating committee (Mary Jo Spangler, Gary Spangler, Sue Mapes, and Jeannette Lasansky) appointed by the president as specified by the UCHS bylaws. These nominees, along with present **Treasurer David Milne** and **Secretary Diane Meixell**, who are up for two-year renewal, will be formally voted on at the Society's September program by current UCHS members present.
