Events at the Dale-Engle-Walker House 1471 Strawbridge Rd., Lewisburg, PA



WORLD WAR I ENCAMPMENT Saturday and Sunday, June 9 and 10, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

World War I re-enactors will be on hand throughout the weekend to discuss soldiering. Fireworks display at dusk on Saturday evening, provided by Just Light It, will celebrate the end of The Great War.



On Saturday, military historian Andy Lysiak will speak about WWI military weapons and Troop M, in which many Central PA men enlisted.

On Sunday, General John J. "Black Jack" Pershing (David Shuey) and Captain Dwight D. Eisenhower (Dan Bower) will share their stories at 1 PM.

"Over There, Over Here," an updated exhibit on how the war affected Union County, and another exhibit featuring Boy Scout memorabilia from the Steve Ranck collection, will be on display in the house.

Tours of this historic dwelling – built by Samuel Dale c. 1793; the site of the Engle family dairy; and the home of Charles & Rosemary Walker – will be offered during the day.

Admission fee of \$5 is good for both days and the fireworks.



As a special remembrance, the historical society has **commemorative T-shirts** for sale featuring World War I **Nurse Helen Fairchild** who died on the Western Front, and **Major Samuel Wolfe** who returned home after the war and continued public service as a Pennsylvania State Senator.

DOIN'S AT THE DEW! DIGGIN' AND BEE-IN' Saturday, June 16, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

An archaeological dig led by Kim Mattern will begin at 9 a.m. for registered students ages nine to

fourteen. Participants will learn how to select a site, document the excavation area, and carefully unearth artifacts left behind by Native Americans centuries ago. Event limited to 20 students. Noted apiarists Dave Hackenberg, Preston Boop, and Mary Ann Frazier will share their knowledge about beekeeping beginning at 1 p.m. Honey products will be on sale during the day. No admission fee; donations accepted and appreciated.

Tours of the Dale-Engle-Walker House will be available during the day. The c. 1793 limestone farmhouse boasts early architectural features, and original hearth with period kitchen equipment. See the c. 1930s Milk House, and the Wagon Shed with vintage farm tools and vehicles. World War I exhibits and Boy Scout memorabilia will be on display in the house. Free admission.

Directions to the Dale/Engle/Walker House: from Route 15 in Lewisburg, take Route 192 west for 1.5 miles, turn north onto Strawbridge Road and continue 1.5 miles to the site. On tour Sundays, drive up the lane to the parking area near the house. For larger events, follow directions of parking attendants to designated areas.

Dear UCHS Members and Friends,

The board realized that UCHS needed to increase our public profile this year by raising awareness, extending our outreach, and increasing community collaboration. Activities over the past few months by our staff and volunteers have certainly helped as we work toward achieving that goal.

The Union County Public Library's branches have graciously hosted a variety of our well-attended programs. Topics ranged from forts on the Susquehanna frontier, to Union County's barns and farmsteads, to Central Pennsylvania's fraktur tradition, to the struggle by the region's women for the right to vote.

Since you received our last newsletter, requests for speakers have been flowing into the office.

Newspaper articles have reported on our progress in achieving StEPs certification by the American Association for State and Local History. This self-assessment program helps UCHS keep up with current recommendations, standards, and practices in the field of public history.

UCHS has also joined with the Smithsonian Institution and 265 similar organizations to promote the nation-wide History Relevance Campaign.

During March and April, students from Bucknell's Management 101 course helped prepare a number of vegetable and flower beds around the Dale-Engle-Walker House. UCHS volunteers also have been revitalizing the property with their time, labor, and plants. This includes creating a new gift shop in the house, removing the invasive forsythia off the east end of the porch, and repainting the dairy shed.

We're also working with the Linn Conservancy to re-examine the conservation easement and, as part of our educational mission, to establish more native plants, shrubs, and trees on the property.

Please plan to attend this summer's "Doin's at the DEW." The first, a World War One Encampment and related period activities, will be on the 9th and 10th of June. The following Saturday, June 16, will feature an archaeological excavation by school students in the morning. The highlight of our afternoon programming on the 16th will be several speakers on the importance of honeybees, along with a presentation honoring local apiarist, Dave Hackenberg.

Dale Library at the Dale-Engle-Walker House

These books have been added to the Dale Library, donated by Jeannette and William Lasansky:

Because of the detailed inventory of Samuel Dale's estate taken at the time of his death in 1804, we know the titles of the 318 books that were in his library. (see partial list on right). The library was researched by the late Wiley Clements of Lewisburg (see Samuel Dale: A Life and Estate 1741 -1804, Heritage XXI, 2008) with additional research support from members of local Girl Scout Troup 1096 for their Gold Award in 2002. By searching the Internet and occasionally coming across a needed title in a local collection, the Society seeks to replace many of the titles inventoried in Dale's will. Some of the volumes the Society has collected were printed prior to 1804; others are replications of hard-to-find originals. There are books waiting to be sponsored.

Bucknell University "Conservatees" at Dale-Engle-Walker Property

Over four days in the Spring, this small army of students from Bucknell's Management 101 class



helped members of the Union County Historical Society and the Merrill Linn Conservancy reinvigorate the landscape around the historical society's Dale-Engle-Walker House. The students dug beds and planted a variety of plants, including native PA species, and removed invasive plants along the Dale's Ridge Trail (maintained by the Linn Conservancy).

Management 101 classes devote a semester developing a project – from inception to finances to completion – for a community organization in the Union County area. The Conservancy and the historical society are glad to have been chosen by this talented group of students for their coursework.

Remember the Dale/Engle/Walker property can be rented for a formal photography session, a family reunion, a wedding ceremony; or full wedding with ceremony, reception, and meal (by your caterer). Rental rates are from \$50-\$500 depending on the length of time and complexity of the preparation and coverage. UCHS members get a 10% discount on big events. Next Generation Historians Honored at National History Day

National History Day®(NHD) is a non-profit education organization that offers year-long academic programs for middle- and high-school students around the world. Students do original research on historical topics of their choosing The National History Day Contest, has more than half a million students from around the world participating. Students enter their projects at the local levels, with top students advancing to the National Contest at the University of Maryland at College Park.

Students from Midd-West Middle School won the largest share of awards for Region 5 at the third annual National History Day competition held on Saturday, February 24, at Lock Haven University. School districts from over 20 counties across northern and central Pennsylvania comprise this region.

Andrew Romig and Skylar Epley won first place in the Junior Group Exhibit category. Tianna Lauver, Mackenzie Fultz and Sherryvinh Inch placed third. In the Junior Individual Exhibit category, Devon Bowman, Darrin Walter, and Halia Keister placed first, second and third respectively. Molley Herrold and Sheri-Leigh Dickerson also won an honorable mention for their exhibit.

Winners go to Carlisle for the state competition in May. State winners from Pennsylvania will move on to the national competition at the University of Maryland in June.

Other participants from Midd-West were Kayli Hollenbach, Haylee Hamilton, Leah Davison, Angel Burkey, Alyssa Heckman, Ava Graybill, Corbin Snook, Caleb Hulme, Jaden Wagner and Lydia Dehoff. Their teachers are Michael Sanders and Loren Collins.

PEOPLE MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Dorothy Lucille Bowersox passed away at home with family on April 11, 2018. She was born Dorothy Lucille LeVier in Brookville, PA, in 1925, and grew up in Middle Run near Hawthorne. She

She graduated from New Bethlehem High School in 1944, then went to work to support the naval war effort in Newport News, VA. In 1947, she married WWII infantry veteran George E. Bowersox, Jr. of New Bethlehem. They settled in Claymont, DE, in 1955 where they raised their sons and lived until 1988. For many years Dottie served as the head store cashier at Sears in Wilmington, DE. Later Dottie and George moved to Newark, DE, where she worked and made many friends at the family's lawn and garden shop.

Dottie had a great love for family and family genealogy. She became the historian for the Bowersox/Bauersachs family, traveling to courthouses throughout Pennsylvania to

gather primary documents and information about her family. Before her passing, Dottie donated her extensive genealogical collection to the Union County Historical Society in Lewisburg, PA

Dottie is survived by sons Larry E. Bowersox (Susan) of Lancaster County, PA; and George E. Bowersox, III (Gail) of Newark, DE; five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. She was predeceased by her husband of 56 years, George E. Bowersox, Jr., by brother Edward LeVier, sisters Leona LeVier Catchpole and Phyllis LeVier Haas.
